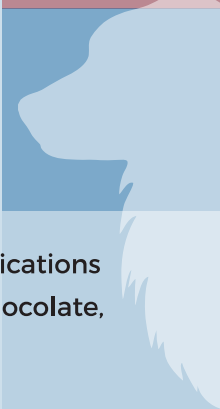
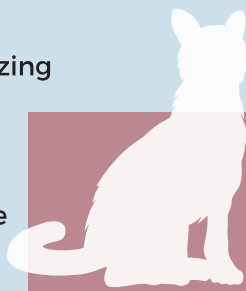


What Might Indicate an Emergency?

- Persistent Vomiting or Diarrhea
- Lethargy
- Pale Gums/Tongue or Skin
- Persistent Coughing or Sneezing
- Bleeding
- Prolonged Labor
- Seizure
- Straining to Urinate/Defecate
- Blood in Urine/Stool/Vomit
- Rapid or Labored Breathing
- Lack of Appetite
- Sudden Severe Limping or Pain
- Difficulty Standing or Collapse
- Acute Injury
- Rapid Weight Loss
- Ingestion of Inappropriate Medications
- Ingestion of Rodent Poison, Chocolate, Antifreeze, or any other Toxin
- Ingestion of Foreign Objects



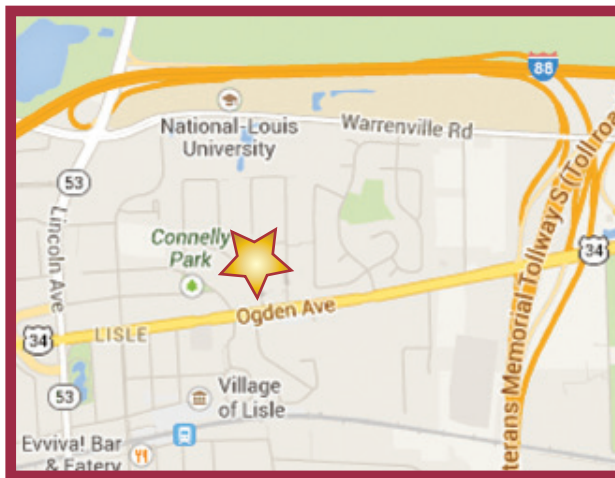

Payment & Fees:

When your pet comes in to be examined there is a basic examination charge. Further charges are dependent upon the doctors recommendations for testing and treatment with your consent.

If your pet requires hospitalization a written estimate will be provided. A deposit will be required for hospitalized cases.

All charges are payable in full at the time your pet is discharged.

What to do if Your Pet is Injured:

Have somebody call **Emergency Veterinary Services** at **(630) 960-2900** immediately to discuss the situation with our staff and allow us to prepare for your arrival.

Always remember, a pet that is in pain could instinctively be protective of their injuries and possibly hurt you as you try to render help. If available, use a muzzle to protect yourself from getting bitten. Wearing thick gloves and long sleeves or using a thick towel may also help protect you from a struggling, scared pet. If your pet cannot walk, you may use a crate, blanket, or board for transport to help keep them as still and comfortable as possible.

If your pet can walk but is weak, provide support under the chest or hindquarters using a large towel as a sling.

If there is any bleeding, cover the area with a thick pack of absorbent material such as gauze, clean cloths, or paper towels and apply firm pressure.



Records:

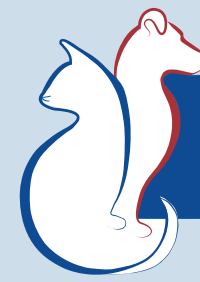
Upon discharge a copy of any test results and X-rays will be sent with you. We also ensure that a full written record is sent to your regular veterinarian.

Meet Our Doctors

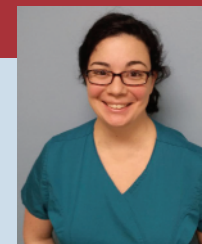


Dr. Amanda (Amy) Smith
